## IT'S ALL OVER NOW: BEACHDOWN OPINIONS

**It all seems a long time ago now but a number of Villagers have points to make about the Beachdown Festival, and by no means all negative**

### Sheila Marshall clears up the 'free ticket' confusion

I was never entirely happy about Fulking only getting 46 free festival tickets but if it wasn't for a few Poynings residents there would only have been a hand full of freebies in total. As soon as I heard about the festival I contacted the organiser to find out more and included a page in the Poynings News. I gave a few copies to Fulking folks and this precipitated the meeting at Fulking.

To my knowledge, at this meeting the festival organiser mentioned that there would be some free tickets and that people had to contact him. Those that did immediately got tickets but those that left it much later

did not. Some got the impression that all those attending the meeting were promised tickets but I don't remember a name sheet going round. After a while the organiser was just too busy to send out tickets so I guess this is why he wanted me to deal with the Fulking tickets too. Every resident was not promised a free ticket.

The situation resulted from a few of us negotiating and compiling a Poynings and Newtimber ticket wish list of 110 wanting free tickets. The Fulking 40 was an addition, allocated by the organiser in the light of a seemingly negative response to the festival from the residents. Once people here had been promised tickets

and a cap of 150 had been put on the total by the festival, it was impossible to undo.

We contacted a few individuals in Fulking to spread the word about the 40 tickets on a first come first served basis and they were gone by 1 June. I suppose we didn't think of the Pigeon Post as its front page usually had a 'How to fight the Festival' article on the front page. [Not strictly true, Sheila!] It became all too clear, after the tickets had all gone, that Fulking, like Poynings and Newtimber, had a lot of people interested in going to the festival. I do feel bad about this but we had only originally set out to get a good deal for Poynings locals as the festival is in our Parish.

### Fiona Shafer had 'A Positive Experience'

I may be in the minority who actually found it a positive experience, given the general hoo hah in the run up to the festival itself.

I attended on the Sunday, which turned out to be a glorious, sunny afternoon. I was very impressed by the overall location and layout of the event, which allowed wonderful views of both sea and downland.

The variety of great music appeared to suit most people's needs and the atmosphere seemed very friendly and relaxed. I met a number of

people from both Poynings and Fulking who seemed to be of the opinion that the festival had been a great success and they hoped it would be back next year. I thought there was far less traffic and people in the village compared to other Bank Holidays, and as for the noise levels – it was a lot quieter than I thought it would be.

### And from Linda Dyos:

Apart from seeing vehicles on the Dyke horizon, I can't honestly say that I noticed the presence of the festival or heard anything at all from Clappers Lane, and would have no objections if the

festival were to continue next year. I wonder if some people in the village over-reacted a little.

### Jen Green:

Personally we felt Beachdown was no bother at all.

### Tony Brooks says: Do we want this?

If any one wants to object to the Beachdown Festival, the organisers will soon be putting in their application for a seven-year festival licence. The Argus carried claims by a Mr J Pidgeon that it was a great success, next year it will be bigger and better with maybe 15,000

## Sussex and the cinema

Pictures: No information on the romantic cinematographer at the top, but we do know that Chichester had a Shippams Paste factory. Here is an edited memoir from <http://www.bbc.co.uk/dna/h2g2/A452260>: "Shippams": The old man, Basil, decided to boil a cow up into paste and put it into a tiny jar in Victorian times, during which era housewives' basic nutritional advice was: "If it tastes bad, it must be doing you some good". Like all Victorian admirers my mother put Shippams paste on my sandwiches. Like all children of Victorian inspired parents I lobbed my sandwiches into a hedge as soon as I was out of sight of my house.'

## A neat idea to beat the cost of winter heat

[www.Boilerjuice.com](http://www.Boilerjuice.com) promises that group buying will make heating oil cheaper. Here is an email from [Rachel Wheeler](#):

'We've just spent £1300 filling up our tank (ouch!) My brother told me about an oil supply website – [boilerjuice.com](http://boilerjuice.com) – which groups orders in the same postcode area together to obtain a bulk discount. I took a look on the site and if I'd used them it would have saved us £250 – too late for us for now but if anyone else is thinking of filling up, definitely worth a look. They do an instant quote on the site. It also means less polluting/street clogging lorries delivering to the village.'

It doesn't look like Boilerjuice do Calor gas, but research is being undertaken to see if the same benefit can apply to gas.

The site itself explains how group buying can work: 'There are 3 ways this can be done:

- Set up your own buying group with friends and neighbours locally using the website.
- Buy oil today and if there are other orders in your postcode area, BoilerJuice will group your order with them. If sufficient volume is achieved (typically 2400 litres) any discounts achieved will be automatically passed on to all buyers in the postcode group.
- Join a weekend buying group.' More information on the site.

It also explains the downsides for those with 'offset pipes', ie the fill point and the tank are distant from one another: 'For safety/environmental reasons

most suppliers decline to deliver to offset fill locations (where the delivery driver cannot see the tank whilst filling). We recommend you make arrangements direct with a regular supplier.'

More explanation from Rachel: 'As I understand it the website searches the oil providers for the cheapest in your postcode and provides you with details of the provider. You then speak to the provider listed on Boilerjuice and seek further discounts based on volume through grouping orders together. I suspect we need to try this to see how effective it is. Had we just looked at Boilerjuice and not grouped orders we would still have saved £250.'

And here is a welcome suggestion from [James Lightfoot](#): 'I suggest we compile a list of

estimated dates when people anticipate needing a supply. That way, we can group people together by fill-up date. I'm happy to coordinate the list if people want to send me anticipated fill-up dates. I'll then email you back the names in each group. Then it's up to those people to coordinate within their group. Going forward, the list can be adjusted to account for different levels of consumption.'

Many thanks James. Report back on how it works, please. Although James has kindly offered to co-ordinate, all he is doing is putting people in touch with each other. From then it's up to the individuals to deal direct with each other and with Boilerjuice.


