

EBERNOE is an ecclesiastical district, formed in 1875 from Kirdford, and is about 5 miles north of Petworth station on the L. B. and South Coast railway, in the North Western division of the county, Arundel rape, Rotherbridge hundred, Petworth petty sessional division, union and county court district, rural deanery of Petworth and archdeaconry and diocese of Chichester. The church of Holy Trinity, erected in 1867 by W. Peachey esq. and endowed by Lord Leconfield, is of brick in the Gothic style, and has a belfry containing one bell: there are 160 sittings. The register dates from the year 1875. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £110, with residence and three-quarters of an acre of glebe, in the gift Elliott Rev. EDBURTON (anciently Edburgtun) is a parish 4 miles east from Bramber station, on the Horsham and Shoreham section of the London, Brighton and South Coast railway, 7 north-west from Brighton and 53 from London, in the Mid division of the county, Atherington and Poynings hundred, Bramber rape, Steyning union and petty sessional division, Brighton county court district, rural deanery of Lewes (second division), archdeaconry of Lewes and diocese of Chichester. The church of St. Andrew is of flint and stone, in the Early English style, and has a tower containing 3 bells: nine of the windows are stained: the font is of lead, and dates from 1180: the church was restored in 1878, at a cost of £1,573, and has 200 sittings. The register dates from the year 1559. The living is a rectory, net yearly value £215, with residence, in the gift of the Archbishop of Canterbury, and held since 1896 by the Rev. Arthur Patteson Wharton M.A. of Downing College, Cambridge.

EGDEAN, called in the Episcopal registers, "Bleatham," is a parish, on the road from Petworth to Arundel, 1½ miles north-west from Fittleworth station, on the Midhurst branch of the London, Brighton and South Coast railway, and 9 east from Midhurst, in the North Western division of the county, rape of Arundel, hundred of Rotheridge, Petworth petty sessional division, union and county court district, rural deanery of Petworth and archdeaconry and diocese of Chichester. The church of St. Bartholomew, built in 1623, is of brick and stone, and has a western bell-cote, containing one bell: a vestry was added in 1898 at a cost of £70: there are 80 sittings. The register commences in the year 1646. The living is a rectory, net yearly value £65, in the gift of the trustees of the late Mrs. Carleton

Cattley Miss

ELSTED, the "Halestede" of Domesday, is a parish with a station 1½ miles south-west from the village, on the Midhurst and Petersfield branch of the South Western railway, 5 miles west from Midhurst, 6 south-east from Petersfield and 52 from London, in the North Western division of the county, Chichester rape, Dumpford hundred, Midhurst petty sessional division, union and county court district, rural deanery of Petworth and archdeaconry and diocese of Chichester. The parish church of St. Paul is an ancient edifice of stone of Early Norman character, and has a turret containing one bell: the church was restored in 1873, when three stained windows were placed by the Rev. Frederick Augustus Vincent B.D. late rector, in memory of his son and sister, but, owing to its dilapidated state, the church was closed in 1893. The register commences in 1571. The living is a rectory, with that of Treyford and the vicarage of Diding annexed, joint net yearly value £300, with 60 acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of and held since 1895 by the Rev. John Adamson Stanley Paget-Moffatt M.A. of Exeter College, Oxford. The Rectory House was presented in 1862 by the late Hon. Mrs. Harcourt. The Primitive Methodist mission room, near the station, erected in 1884 by Edwin Albery esq. of Midhurst, is an

Lord Leconfield, who is lord of the manor, and the Crown are the principal landowners. The soil is green sand, clay and part gravel; subsoil, chalk and clay. The chief crops are wheat, barley, oats and potatoes. The area is 1,239 acres; rateable value, £555; the population in 1891 was 359.

Fulking, formerly a hamlet in this parish, has, under the provisions of the "Local Government Act, 1894," been formed into a civil parish in 1895.
