FIELDS, HILLS, DOGS AND CATTLE 'Your dog could be shot if it worries livestock'

DOG owners are being warned not to let their pets run freely in the countryside where livestock is grazing or they could see them shot.

At least 15 sheep were killed by dog worrying attacks in Mid Sussex last year. Now, with farmers seeing lambs being stillborn due to Schnallenberg disease, they are likely to be more on their

guard to potential threats, warns Sussex Police.

Wildlife Crime Officer PC Geoff Bennett said: "Sheep and other livestock worrying is an on-going problem and as the South East fills up with more and more people, there are more and more dogs around. Unfortunately, people think they can let their dogs off the lead in a field and let them run but that is not a right and the dogs and the owners should stick to

footpaths. If a dog starts to worry livestock be it sheep, cattle or horses and a farmer has a shotgun with him then he will shoot."

PC Bennett reminded people that a dog on a lead in a field with cattle was no protection as cattle would charge, a situation that was known to have caused human deaths.

He said anxious farmers were reporting around 15 per cent of lambs being stillborn due to Schnallenberg disease and any further losses would be traumatic. The high demand for lamb meat for curry restaurants was also likely to cause reduced breeding stock, shortages and price rises. Sheep killed last year suffered horrific injuries with others aborting their lambs and having to be put down. Incidents of livestock worrying should be reported to Sussex Police by dialling 101 or 999.

Notwithstanding the ever so slightly dubious reference to 'curry restaurants', I have been asked to run the above piece - I guess from The Argus – about dogs in the countryside. The cattle on the hill have also been making themselves unpopular again, although this time not to the point of fisticuffs in the Village Hall. The recent rain has enhanced their mud-making activities to a point where walking on the hill has become more of a chore than a delight, and Villagers have become vocal about it. Philippa Morrison-Price, the South Downs National Park Ranger, explains:

'Andrew Triggs our LDF Policy Officer has asked me to get in touch about concerns raised at your recent community meeting regarding Fulking Escarpment. As the South Downs National Park Ranger for this area I would like to explain about the work that is happening there.

'Fulking Escarpment is a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI) because of its chalk grassland habitat. Landowners have a statutory obligation to manage SSSI's which is why the National Trust has been carrying out scrub clearance and grazing cattle to improve the condition and biodiversity value of the site which is currently classed as "unfavourable recovering" by Natural England. The South Downs National Park has

contributed funding towards this and our volunteers have helped to clear some of the scrub.

'Grazing is a traditional form of management on chalk grassland sites and provides favourable conditions for wild flowers and invertebrates. It keeps the taller, rank grasses down, allowing for the more desirable chalk grassland herbs to flourish. Bare ground created by the cows' hooves encourages seed germination and their dung is valuable to a number of invertebrate species. There are areas of Tor grass on the site, which if left unmanaged would spread and reduce the quality of the grassland. Grazing cattle in the spring is the most effective

way of keeping this invasive grass under control.

'Due to the wet spring we are experiencing, the cows may have caused some poaching at the bottom of the slope. I have spoken to the National Trust and they are doing everything they can to prevent any further damage, by splitting the herd and reducing numbers.

The difference is that a Neighbourhood Plan is a statutory document and, if accepted and voted for by the community, has to be adopted by the District Council, although it can still be overridden. It is not compulsory to submit a plan –
