Fulking Fair picks up the pace



The Fulking Fair Action Committee (really the Social Committee with a few unruly additions) took pleasure in the first Fair Planning meeting at Perching Holt on 17 March. Activities were discussed and decided upon and tasks allotted, but the main topic of conversation was Charmayne and Harry Diamond's very generous offer of the use of their double field. 'Downside Meadow'. which stretches from the north side of Poynings Road just after the road turns sharp left at the exit to the village right down to Clapper's Lane, where it turns sharp left near the entrance to the cricket club. The photographs above show the gate to the Meadow at the top, and then the second, lower field which has a very welcoming, tranquil air about it. It also has trees and hedges for shade, and will, says Charmayne,



be trimmed, topped and generally manicured to a high standard.

Despite an affection for the North Town Field, which most Folkingites will surely feel, the Diamonds' handsome offer is to be taken seriously - if only because the top field is perfect for parking and the lower one seems just right for the festive occasion itself. The other major argument in its favour is that the Fair is getting set to rival the controversial Beachdown Festival (see below) in scale, if not in volume of noise, and the diminutive NTF will be hard pushed to cope. We already have 44 lines and counting in the 'Fair's Fairest' volunteer spreadsheet, not all of which represent separate stalls and activities, but there's no doubt that we won't be spoilt for choice of what to do with ourselves that sunny August afternoon (subtle

hint to the Weather Gods). The only possible obstacle to the village taking the Diamonds up on their offer is insurance. The implications are being investigated and a decision will be made in time for an announcement in the next PP. Meanwhile, heartfelt thanks to Charmayne and Harry.

Be careful though, and read it with a pinch of salt, if such a thing is possible – by no means all the names against the 'line items' are genuine volunteers. There does seem to be room, however, to air one or two of the more recent and less sensible suggestions, which may tickle someone's fancy: a village scarecrow competition, a plate painting project to commemorate the Harvest Festival, chicken races, displays of the rudest and the most animal-like vegetables, a search for the best decorated flowerpot... and many more besides. Beachdown O9 goes ahead despite localised pressure A disappointed Richard Corner reports from the licensing application hearing

The Beachdown licensing application hearing ended on Tuesday 10 March, with approval being given to Future Festivals' application for Beachdown 2009. That result was disappointing for those Fulking and Poynings residents who had noise problems last year. The one consolation is that 2009's live music is restricted on Friday and Saturday to 11pm, rather than 12 midnight as in 2008.

My request for the bass

noise limits to be reduced from 65 to 55dB wasn't approved.

• Future Festivals verbally committed themselves to remeasuring the ambient noise levels in Fulking at Hillbrook Farm, Clappers Lane, and at Thatchley, The Street. Every 24 hours, computerised monitoring logs from these locations plus two in Poynings will be printed and passed by Beachdown's noise consultant to MSDC by midday. • Future Festivals promised that their noise monitoring line would be better manned than in 2008 – when it appeared to be one single person. The Licensing Committee did not agree to MSDC providing an independent noise helpline as they did in 2008 (though all that line did was to forward calls to Beachdown).

 In 2009, Future Festivals plan to squeeze cars into the car park by using valet parking. They also promise that car parking won't extend outside the licensed area and block the South Downs Way (both happened in 2008).

• There are no free tickets for Fulking and Poynings residents this year.

Chris' Nettle Watch

The Nettles are springing up now. Although nasty, remember they provide places for butterflies to lay their eggs and food for the caterpillars! Try this nettle soup:

- 1lb chopped potatoes
- Half a pound of young nettles (picked with gloves!)
- Chicken or vegetable stock
- Butter, salt and black pepper

• 4 tablespoons of sour cream. Cook the potatoes for 10 minutes, then drain. Melt the butter and add the nettles and stew gently for a few minutes. Add the potatoes and heated stock, and simmer for 10 minutes or until tender. When soft, cool slightly and puree in a blender. Add seasoning and sour cream.

Spray warning

A villager walking up to the field below the North Town Field recently fell foul of a crop sprayer and although she took action to avoid the field itself, was nevertheless unable to

prevent herself inhaling the

spray, 'Enveloped in it' is how she describes it. The Countryside Agency's booklet 'Managing Public Access - A Guide for Land Managers', available at www. countrysideaccess.gov.uk, - and endorsed by the Country Land and Business Association and the National Farmers' Union - says: 'In general, public rights of way and other highways should not be oversprayed. Pesticides and herbicides should be confined to the adjacent crop. You should cease spraying immediately if anyone steps on to a path which crosses or adjoins a field that is being sprayed. Allow them adequate time to get clear before recommencing spraying.' Farmers and those that work for them please take note.

Organised by Mid Sussex (South) Council for Voluntary Service, the Volunteer Information Point, Burgess Hill Town Council and Mid Sussex District Council, the fair will have stalls, activities and workshops of greenish hue.
