Michael Trist introduces a timely Village initiative – and a call to action for those who believe that to go global you have to start local

- Want to save money and the planet?
- Worried about the price of fuel?
- Would like to give your cash to local food producers instead of the supermarkets?

These questions, and plenty more besides, were among the items discussed at the first meeting of like minds at Bob and Pam Rowland's house recently. We are continually bombarded with scary stories about climate change, and unless your initials are GWB, you probably go

along with the 95 per cent of scientists in the world who are convinced that this is happening NOW, and that this is not some unproved hypothesis. Now is our chance to club together to make a difference.

The starting point to our discussions was the idea of 'Peak Oil', i.e. the time when crude oil supplies begin running out. At that moment, oil production would have peaked, hence the name. The emphasis is on practical, local solutions, and we have tasked ourselves with researching the range of

options that are available on fuel, transport, food etc. We then intend to present these to an open meeting in the Village Hall in January. Similar discussions are taking place in towns and villages across the country as part of a network of Transition Towns (making the transition to life after oil), including Henfield and Poynings, with whom we are already in contact. From Mid Sussex District **Councillor Gina Field** (unofficially, as no report is as yet available from **MSDC**, statutory bodies or emergency services):

MY CONCLUSION - should this festival be permitted to grow, to make it safe for larger numbers, permanent infrastructure would have to be put in place including widening of the Devil's Dyke access road, internal hardtop trackways, grasscrete in the car parks; installation of water, electricity, sewage and proper shelter for staff and emergency services in the event of continued inclement weather. This step would, of course, compromise

the special status of Devil's Dyke.

Ivy, honey




