Do you have questions about the way of life in Fulking? Elsie Aisher has lived and worked here for 80 years and will be happy to tell you...

Q Elsie, was the stage in the Village Hall used much when you were young?

A Oh yes. Shows and plays and concerts. A local man, Paul, made and painted wonderful scenery, and helped with costumes and scripts. There was always a good pantomime. There were several talented musicians: a very good trumpeter, some beautiful singers. It was well supported up to about 1965.

Q Did Fulking have allotments like Poynings does?

A There were allotments in the fields opposite the last houses on the road to Poynings. Some food was short even after the War had ended.
