Parish Council News by Mark Hind, Chair of Fulking PC

Roads

You may well be as frustrated as I am regarding the ongoing roadworks affecting our village. The Parish Council has no involvement in the approval and scheduling of this essential work which is controlled by West Sussex County Council (WSCC). However, we have pressured WSCC to improve the signage used by the contractors including removing the signs when work is not actually underway e.g. weekends. In addition we have ensured that, in future, we will receive advance notification of road closures from WSCC which we will circulate via email.

Clappers Lane has been in a poor state ever since I moved here in 1992 and especially the water which covers the road at all times of the year. I am pleased to advise that we have recently agreed with South East Water to undertake a survey to identify whether the water is run off from the fields/springs or in fact leaking pipes. In addition, I am hopeful that our application to WSCC for a grant under their "Operation Watershed" initiative will be successful, in which case we will be undertaking water management groundworks on the Lane. Sorry, more road closures to come!

New Ruskin Ram Pump Sign

Following restoration of the "fountain" by the Parish Council in the 1990s, a leaflet was produced which described the history of Fulking's "Water Supply System". In conjunction with South Downs National Park we are now going to install a sign, close to the RAM pump by the Shepherd and Dog car park, which provides a summary of this history for visitors to the village. A big thank you to Gerald Gazdar and Miles Firth who provided content and photos. I have just signed off the artwork, so hopefully the sign will be installed before the end of the year.
