Parish Council News by Mark Hind, Chair of Fulking Parish Council (PC) New Parish Councillor

I'd like to welcome Linda Comber onto the Parish Council. Linda has lived in Fulking for many years and following a vacancy put herself forward for the Council, which unanimously approved her co-option at our last meeting.

Clappers Lane Traffic Regulation Order

In response to resident complaints, we have been investigating what we can do to help reduce the speed of some traffic travelling along Clappers Lane. I am pleased to advise that West Sussex County Council have now proposed a permanent Traffic Regulation Order (TRO). This will introduce a 30mph speed limit on Clappers Lane, from its junction with Holmbush Lane, south to the existing 20mph speed limit by the cricket ground. Our request for a lower speed limit was assessed by WSCC, which decided that a 30mph speed limit was most suitable for the road. Public consultation on this TRO ended on 24 August and we are hopeful this will be approved.

Playground

The annual independent safety check was undertaken at the end of July. Unfortunately, the suspended logs element was identified as an immediate safety risk so has been removed. The safety report also identified that the agility trail may be beyond the point of economical repair. We are seeking the help of Mid Sussex District Council to see what support/grants may be available to assist with increasing costs. We would also like to see what assistance villagers can provide to help maintain this valuable resource. The playground will be on the agenda at our next meeting on Thursday 12 October.

Remembering my friend Anne Hind who died so suddenly on 30 May.

When you look back, it is strange how friendships happen. A chance conversation over a garden gate about, of all things, motorbikes and then some 30 years later Anne and I were still chatting. We didn't have a regular routine for getting together to catch up but each time we met, even after long intervals, we would pick up from where we had left off.

Anne was always full of good ideas, sound advice and common sense so that we could find the right answers for whatever we were considering, however complicated the subject matter. I am very grateful for the help and support she gave me during my Dad's illness and following his death earlier this year.

On reflection, most of my strongest memories revolve around giggling, laughing, food and drink. The waitress who asked 'Who are the two tarts?' when delivering our filled pastry starters; looking at each other with blue lips and tongues after eating a local bilberry dessert in Alsace; being taught an instant cure for hiccups by a French restaurant owner when she delivered a bill containing two extra zeros in the total cost. It is impossible to drink Chablis without being reminded of Anne's decision to order a premier cru, whatever the expense, to celebrate our joint holiday! There will now be an empty hole where there used to be fun and chatter, but the memories will continue to help fill that space.

Remembering Gill Milner (28.12.1934 - 28.7.2023) by Tricia Robinson

Sadly we have lost our lovely Gill, who lived in Fulking for around 40 years. A remarkable lady, she was intelligent and kind. For many years Gill ran the Post Office / shop. This was paradise for children, with sweets, books and toys for sale. Gill stocked an array of goods, fresh milk and bread for sale, along with crafts, pottery, pictures and cards from local artists. Sadly patronage dwindled and the shop was closed.

Gill and Stuart supported village activities over the years. When residents took over running the village hall, Gill supported all activities. At the Toddlers group Gill was the main star! Having been a teacher, she really understood little children, and was like a magnet for them. At our Craft group Gill's creative ability outshone us all with her wacky projects! At Yoga she insisted on trying more advanced postures, which was scary for the teacher! Gill attended the Quotations group and enjoyed playing devil's advocate to stimulate discussion. She was a good listener, wise and clever, but above all kind and thoughtful. Gill's family organised a beautiful celebration of her life at the Preston Nomads, which was attended by her family and friends. Thanks to everyone who gave flowers and cakes. It was a fitting tribute to Gill.

Bobservation No 108 September 2023 Fulking Village Hall

Whilst the possible purchase of the village hall from the Church is being discussed by the Parish Council, it is relevant to point out that, whatever happens, the annual costs of running the hall will continue to increase because of the age of the building and, I guess, will be upwards of £3,000 pa. in the immediate future. On current performance it will be difficult to raise this sort of money (this year's fair raised between £800 and £900, some of which may be needed for the North Town Field). So far as I can see there is no easy answer to this and without a generous donor it will be difficult to continue. Perhaps a way forward is to ask the PC to look into whether it is possible for them to take on the expense of running the hall with an increase in the precept, in this way all villagers would share the cost. It might be a sensible path to take.
